### **Parents as Teachers**

Parents as Teachers (PAT) is an evidence-based parent education and family support program that serves families throughout pregnancy until their child's kindergarten completion. Certified parent educators visit families at least once a month and share age-appropriate child development information to engage families in activities that provide meaningful parent-child interaction. This home visiting program also offers hearing, vision, and developmental screenings to detect developmental delays and/or health issues early on in a child's life. For the program year 2022-23, Parent Possible oversaw 25 PAT partner sites offering services in 32 Colorado counties.






# **PAT Survey results**

Parents and guardians report PAT changes the way they support their child(ren) and themselves. Participation in PAT increases guardians' understanding of their child's development, knowledge of positive parenting practices, and motivates guardians to try new parenting strategies.




In addition, survey respondents report a strengthened relationship with their child, being better able to handle stress, and support from their Parent Educator in working towards goals they set for their family.





The Bracken School Readiness Assessment-3 (BSRA-3) is a school readiness assessment that measures children's skills in five areas: color recognition, letter recognition, numbers and counting, size comparisons, and shape recognition. When first assessed, the average PAT child correctly identified fewer than 50% of letters (25%), numbers (26%), shapes (40%), and size comparisons (42%). After participating in PAT, the average child scored between 16 and 20-points higher on these four measures. Scores were very high for color recognition both before (77%) and after (93%) involvement with PAT. An increase in percentile rank from pre-test to post-test suggests children enrolled in PAT are learning faster than their same-aged peers that are not part of the program. Overall, the average PAT child moved from the 51st percentile at the start of the year to the 62nd percentile at the end.

## PAT strengthens parent-child interactions


The PICCOLO (Parenting Interactions with Children: Checklist of Observations Linked to Outcomes) is a strengths-based measure of parenting interactions that predicts children's early social, cognitive, and language development. The PICCOLO measures four domains: affection, responsiveness, encouragement, and teaching.

PAT families complete a PICCOLO within three months of enrollment or a child turning 10 months of age and again each fall. Fewer PAT guardians scored below average from pre to post test on measures of "affection" (7% pre vs 6% post), "encouragement" (10% vs 9%), "teaching" (11% vs 7%), and "responsiveness" (12% vs 11%). Overall, fewer PAT guardians scored below average (8% vs 5%) and more scored above average (62% post vs 59% pre).

### The PICCOLO measures:

- Affection: Warmth, physical closeness, and positive expressions toward child
- **Responsiveness:** Responding to child's cues, emotions, words, interests, and behaviors
- Encouragement: Active support of exploration, effort, skills, initiative, curiosity, creativity, play
- **Teaching:** Shared conversation and play, cognitive stimulation, explanations and questions
